Summary: Sophie and Josh Newman are 15-year-old twins who have been trained in the Magics of Air, Fire, and Water and have auras (electric fields that define a person) of pure silver and gold color, the most powerful type. They are the twins of legend, chosen to save the world from absolute destruction by the Elders - Gods, who want the world to be like it used to, where humans were slaves and/or food. The twins had just been teleported back in time to the land of Danu Talis, where the legends of Atlantis come from, and set off to the palace. When they got there, they were greeted by their parents, who called themselves Isis and Osiris, but they wondered how their parents had gotten there. They soon start to suspect that these people aren't their real parents. Over dinner, Isis and Osiris, reveal to them that they in fact aren't twins, and Josh is a Neanderthal and Sophie is Russian, and that they stored them in another Shadowrealm (alternate universe) until the time was right, and that they are not their actual parents. After dinner, the "twins" go into the Pyramid of the Sun to wait until the leadership passing happened. While they were in the pyramid, they were attacked by bear-men sent by Anubis, but they successfully defended themselves. They escaped, and started the trek up the mile-and-a-half high pyramid. When they get to the top, Isis and Osiris were waiting for them. The twins only then figure out the Elders' plan to use them to rule. They tell Isis and Osiris that they figured out their plan, and then, the Elders transform into Earthlords, the first race on earth. The twins attack them, and then Josh stabs them with Clarent and Excalibur, and they die. Sophie jumps onto a flying saucer, and Josh destroys Danu Talis by focusing a wave of energy into the pyramid, and becomes Maryethu, someone who helped the characters through the series. **Opinion:** This book was confusing, surprising, and entertaining.
